

THE FEI CODE OF CONDUCT FOR THE WELFARE OF THE HORSE

The Fédération Equestre Internationale (FEI) expects all those involved in international equestrian sport to adhere to the FEI's Code of Conduct and to acknowledge and accept that at all times the welfare of the horse must be paramount and must never be subordinated to competitive or commercial influences.

- 1. At all stages during the preparation and training of competition horses, welfare must take precedence over all other demands. This includes good horse management, training methods, farriery and tack, and transportation.
- 2. Horses and Athletes must be fit, competent and in good health before they are allowed to compete. This encompasses medication use, surgical procedures that threaten welfare or safety, pregnancy in mares and the misuse of aids.
- 3. Events must not prejudice horse welfare. This involves paying careful attention to the competition areas, ground surfaces, weather conditions, stabling, site safety and fitness of the horse for onward travel after the event.
- 4. Every effort must be made to ensure that horses receive proper attention after they have competed and that they are treated humanely when their competition careers are over. This covers proper veterinary care, competition injuries, euthanasia and retirement.
- 5. The FEI urges all involved with the sport to attain the highest levels of education in their areas of expertise.



4. ENTRIES

IMPORTANT

- Entries must be made by NFs through the FEI Entry System for all categories of this Event (https://invitation.fei.org/login);

- All Athletes and Horses participating in any International Competition must be registered with the FEI;
- Athletes and/or Horses present at the Event without having been entered through the FEI's Online Entry System will be automatically disqualified unless compelling circumstances warrant otherwise.

4.1 Nominated Entries

Entries have to be in accordance with Art. 251 of the FEI Jumping Rules, 27th edition, 1st January 2022, updates effective 1st January 2023.

Detailed entries with all complete information are required (names of Athletes and Horses). According to FEI General Regulations Art. 116.4, the list of Nominated Entries may consist of a higher number of Athletes and Horses than the Definite Entries. The maximum permitted numbers for Nominated Entries per NF are detailed below.

Nominated Entries: Monday 31st July 2023 – by 11:59 pm CEST

10 athletes and 10 horses can be entered. Once the nominated entries have been sent in, NFs may send fewer athletes and/or horses but never more than the number of nominated entries.

4.2 Certificate of Capability

4.3 Definite Athlete Numbers

To assist in planning (including confirming stabling numbers for venue development purposes), the OC is asking NFs to confirm on 1st August 2023 by 11:59 pm CEST the definite number of Athletes and Horses (including reserves where appropriate) they intend to submit at Definite Entries (for maximum number see Definite Entries section 4.4). Entry fees are to be paid no later than this date 1st August 2023 by 11:59 pm CEST based on the Definite Athlete Numbers (see 4.4).

4.4 Definite Entries

5 athletes and 5 horses can be entered. The names of the Athletes and Horses being definitely entered must be indicated and selected from those Athletes and Horses on the Nominated entry list.

Definite Entries: Monday, 7th August 2023 by 11:59 pm CEST

5 Athletes and 5 Horses can be entered. The definite entries must be chosen from the list of names of the nominated

entries.

Riders participating in the European Championship cannot take part in CSI 2* Open.

IMPORTANT: As a result of the rule change effective from 1 January 2022, the 5th team riders will be able to take part in the Championship as individuals.

4.5 Substitutions

Last date for substitutions: Tuesday 29th August 2023, 1 hour prior to the horse inspection

4.6 Entry Fees

Entry fees must be paid by 1st August 2023 by 11:59 pm CEST in Euros (€) by all respective NFs. Fees will be calculated on the basis of the number of Athletes/Horses confirmed at 'Definite Athlete Numbers' stage (see 4.4 above) including reserve Horses.

The entry fee includes:

- Stabling (from Sunday 27th August to Monday 4th September)
- The first bedding is shavings (N° 5 packages per box). If Straw is wanted as the first bedding, please order this by the Definite Entry deadline.
- Horse lorry parking
- Power supply (only incl. for lorries used for accommodating grooms)*
- Full Photo Service Free per each rider
- Tack Room (two tack rooms for each team and one take room for every three Horses of Individuals)

CH-EU-S: 750 € per Horse + VAT 22% (total fee per horse € 915,00 including VAT)

* If lorries are used for other accommodation than grooms, an extra fee will be billed.

4.10 No Shows/Late Withdrawals

N.B. In the case of withdrawals after the date of definite entries or no-shows the athlete or the respective NF will be held liable to reimburse the OC for the actual financial loss incurred by the OC (i.e. stabling and hotel expenses) as a result of the withdrawal or no-show.

Amount charged:

400 € (incl. 22% VAT) per horse, plus costs for hotel rooms, 200 € per each room per night. Please note that no-show also refers to a later arrival in the Hotel than the date booked by the NF

The starting order in the first Competition is drawn in the presence of the Ground Jury, the Foreign Technical Delegate and the Chefs d'Equipe at a time fixed by the President of the Ground Jury in agreement with the OC after the training session. The draw for the starting order for individuals and teams will be conducted in accordance with the procedure laid down in JRs Art. 252. The Chefs d'Equipe of the teams with only three

The Score obtained by each Athlete in the first Competition will be converted into Penalties according to the following method. Each Athlete's time will be multiplied by the coefficient 0.50 and converted into points; the points must be rounded to two decimal places. The second decimal place will be rounded up from .005 and rounded down from .004. The Athlete with the lowest number of points after this conversion will be given zero Penalties, the other Athletes being credited with the number of Penalties representing the difference in points between each of them and the leading Athlete.

If an Athlete is eliminated or does not complete his/her round for any reason, he/she will be penalised with 20 Penalties more than the Athlete who has been the most severely penalised after the times of all Athletes who completed the Competition have been converted into Penalties.

The starting order of individual Athletes in Round 1 of the Team Competition is according to the reverse order of individual classification in the first Competition. In case of equality of Penalties for any place Athletes retain the same starting place as in the

first Competition.

Teams – Round 1: Following the first Individual Competition, teams are

divided into two groups based on the results of the best three Athletes in each team. The first group of teams to start in the first round of the Team Competition is that with teams placed eleventh and beyond. The group with teams placed first to tenth and those placed ex aequo for tenth place start last. Teams in each group start in the reverse order of classification resulting from the first Individual Competition. There is a draw to decide the starting order for teams in case

of equality of Penalties.

Number of Starters – Round 2: Individuals:

The 50 Athletes (plus those tied for 50th place) having the best score deriving from the addition of the scores obtained in the First Individual Qualifying Competition and Round 1 of Team Competition (Second Individual Qualification Competition) are allowed to participate in the Third Individual Qualification Competition which is the Round 2 of the Team Competition.

If the Athletes qualified as above are not members of a team which has been qualified to participate in Round 2 of the Team Competition, said Athletes will compete prior to Round 2 of the Team Competition.

Teams:

Round two is open only to the ten best placed teams and those teams equal on Penalties for tenth place after Round 1 of the Team Competition. Teams that withdraw before the start of Round 2 will not be replaced. All teams allowed to compete in Round 2 of the Team Competition carry their Penalties forward from the First Individual Qualifying Competition and Round 1 of the Team Competition.

Score obtained in Round 2 by members of Teams who are not among the Athletes eligible to compete in the Third Individual Qualifying Competition as mentioned above, count only for the classification of them respective teams.

Starting order:

According to Art. 326.4 (Rules for Jumping Championships and Games, 27th Edition 2023).

Individuals - Round 2:

The starting order of the individuals qualified to compete (see above) is set according to the reverse order of the aggregate Penalties incurred in the First and the Second Individual Qualifying Competitions. In case of Athletes with equality of Penalties, the score of the first Competition will decide their starting order.

Break:

There will be at least 15 minutes interval between the individual athletes and the team athletes.

Teams - Round 2:

The starting order of the teams qualified for Round 2 is set according to the reverse order total Penalties of the best three Athletes per team incurred in the First Individual Qualifying Competition and of the best

three Athletes per team in the Round 1 of the Team Competition. Teams with equality of Penalties retain the starting order of Round 1.

Scores: Scores of individuals who are members of any team

eligible to participate in Round 2 (see above) will count for the classification of their team in the Team Competition but also as their personal result in the Third Qualifying Competition if they are among the 50

Athletes mentioned above.

Team Placing

The ten teams and those with equality of Penalties for tenth place receive their placing by adding the Penalties incurred by the best three Athletes in each team in the first Competition and the Penalties incurred by the three best Athletes in each of the two rounds of the second Competition. The team, which has obtained the least number of Penalties will be placed first and declared Continental Team Champion. In the event of equality of Penalties between teams for first, second and/or third place, there will be a jump-off against the clock in which all team Athletes may take part, over six obstacles, which may be increased in height and/or spread at a speed of 400 m per minute. At the discretion of the Technical Delegate, depending on the size of the arena, the speed may be reduced to 375 m per minute. In case of equality of Penalties for any other placing, teams will be placed equal.

The score in this jump-off is obtained by adding the Penalties incurred by the three best Athletes in each team, but in the event of further equality of Penalties, the times of these three Athletes in the jump-off added together will decide the winning team as well as those placed second or third. The score of this jump-off is only to determine the placing of the teams and will not count towards the final scores of the individual Athletes.

If two jump-offs are required, the jump-off for the third place shall precede the jump-off for the first and the second place.

If after the jump-off there is equality of Penalties and time for one of the first three places, the teams concerned will be placed equal.

8. CEREMONIES

8.1 Medal and Prize-Giving Ceremonies

The number of athletes required to present themselves for the prize-giving ceremony is 3 individuals/3 teams: athletes are request to take part with the Championship Horse. The participation in the medal ceremony and lap of honor is obligatory for all athletes.

8.2 Medal Celebrations

8.3 Mixed Zone, Press Conferences and Interviews

All Chefs d'Equipe, Athletes, team personnel and especially medalists and placed athletes are expected to make themselves available for interviews when requested by the OC of FEI Jumping European Championship Milano 2023.

In addition, all Athletes and Team Trainers will be obliged to pass through the flash interview and mixed zones after competing.

All medalists, placed athletes and the best Italian athlete are obliged to attend the planned Press Conferences after the medal ceremonies. Other persons may be requested by media, and their presence would be greatly appreciated upon request of the OC of FEI Jumping European Championship Milano 2023 and Media Team.

8.4 Kiss & Cry Areas

A maximum of 8 Accreditation Holders are allowed in the Kiss and Cry area and it is the responsibility of the Chief d'Equipe of the competing Athlete to administer the 8 persons.

9. VENUE

The San Siro Racecourse is a unique location. Inaugurated in April 1920, The San Siro Racecourse is one of the most prestigious horse racing venues in the world since a century. Designed by architect Paolo Vietti Violi, it is entirely built in Liberty style, the only racecourse in the world declared a "monument of national interest". The facility owner has carefully planned several renovations to fully meet the specifications and requirements of the Championship, the entire area dedicated to Show Jumping is in fact within the tracks, in the heart of the Snai San Siro Racecourse.

Dogs must be kept on a leash throughout the venue.

13.4 Veterinary Examinations, Horse inspections and Passport Controls

For all issues relating to FEI Horse Passports/FEI Recognition Cards please contact your National Federation.

All Horses competing at FEI Events must be registered with the FEI.

FEI Passports or FEI Recognition Cards (for those Horses with a national passport approved by the FEI) are compulsory for FEI Events.

NB: Horses entered in CIMs and in CSIP in their country of residence are not required to have an FEI Passport or FEI Recognition Card but must be properly registered with the FEI and identifiable (FEI General Regulations, Art. 137.2).

Athletes who do not present a Horse's Passport and/or Recognition Card, or one that is not correctly validated or fail to meet other passport requirements will be subject to Sanctions in accordance with Annex VI of the FEI Veterinary Regulations and may not be allowed to compete.

NB for Horses permanently resident in a Member State of the European Union: all Horses must have a national EU passport in compliance with EU Regulations to which a FEI Recognition card is applied. The exception to this being Horses in possession of an FEI passport which has been continually revalidated without interruption

13.5 Examination on arrival. FEI Veterinary Regulation Art. 1029

On arrival at an Event venue, all Horses must undergo an examination by a veterinarian to confirm their identification from their passport and micro-chip ID (where present), their vaccination status and general health. To protect all horses attending events, any Horse with a questionable health status concerning vaccination, disease or other concerns, must be stabled within the isolation facilities provided by the Organising Committee pending a decision on entering the venue. PRs must fulfil the Horse Health Requirements via the FEI HorseApp in advance of the event which will be checked at the Examination on Arrival.

13.6 Horse Inspection

All Horses will be assessed for their fitness to compete during the Horse Inspection. Any Horse demonstrating questionable fitness may be referred to the Holding Box for further veterinary examination. Horses not deemed fit to compete by the Inspection Panel will not be permitted to compete.

13.7 Vaccinations

Horses competing at FEI Events must comply with the requirements for Equine Influenza vaccination in accordance with the Veterinary Regulations.

All FEI registered Horses intending to compete at FEI Events (including CIMs) must be vaccinated against Equine Influenza in accordance with these Veterinary Regulations. The exception being if the applicable domestic legislation prevents the use of Equine Influenza vaccines within the relevant territory.

All participating horses must be in possession of:

- a declaration (with a detailed list) from their own NF stating that the same is temporarily imported into Italy to take part in the Championship (official name of the competition, date and address);
- an ATA form, especially for extra European Countries or in the case the horse will pass through not EU Countries (crossing not communitarian nations) (for further information see: http://www.atacarnet.com/);
- Apply to the competent Health Authority for Health Certificates for horses, based on the new EU Regulations currently in force. It is advisable to check with the Health Authority the formalities relating to the transport authorization also.



Absolutely necessary for national sanitary Authorities:

- Horses coming from the rest of Italy: Transport (Model 4) and health certificate.
- Horses coming from EU: International Transport Certificate valid between EU members.
- Horses coming from other countries: Valid Certificate which is required at the moment of entry.

Other Recommended Immunisations

The Veterinary Service Team of Milano 2023 recommends that all NFs, even if not compulsory under FEI Rules and Regulations, give serious consideration and implement vaccination strategies to ensure their Horses have established immunity against Equine Herpes Virus Type I.

Any vaccinations should be recorded on the Horse's individual passport or accompanying health certificate.

13.8 Equine Anti-Doping and Controlled Medication Testing

13.8.1 Sampling. FEI Veterinary Regulations, Chapter VII

All horses competing at FEI Events may be subject to sampling for the presence of Prohibited Substances in accordance with the Anti-Doping and Controlled Medication Regulations (EADCMRs). Horses may be selected for sampling in accordance with obligatory testing, targeted or random sampling procedures. Refer to FEI Financial Charges for details of fees relating to Equine and Human Anti-Doping program (EADCMP), which OCs/NFs have the right to charge to the athlete (applicable for all FEI events worldwide).

13.8.2 Elective Testing. Fei Veterinary Regulations Articles 1058

Elective Testing may be carried out prior to an Event to check for the presence of Prohibited Substances. Please refer to https://inside.fei.org/fei/cleansport/horses for information and details.

13.9 Injury Surveillance

See FEI Veterinary Regulations 15th edition, 1st January 2023 Chapter VIII.

Horses participating in FEI Events are subject to injury surveillance protocols; and in the event of fatality, a post mortem examination.

13.10 Transport of horses

Horses must be fit to travel and be transported in suitable vehicles for the transport of horses. Any government requirements for disease testing and control must be requested well in advance, to ensure that the horse is in compliance by the time of arrival at the border of the country where the Event is taking place. Athletes, or their representatives, have the responsibility to comply with national legislation in both their country of origin and the host nation of the Event. Where necessary athletes must contact local government authorities or

veterinary advisors for information regarding animal health requirements and transport legislation. Within the European Union (EU), this includes EU Council Regulation (EC) No 1/2005 concerning the protection of animals during transport within the Member States of the EU.

13.11 Team Veterinarians

Upon arrival at the venue, all official Team Veterinarians must announce their presence at the office in the veterinary area and provide the Veterinary Centre with a completed PTV Event Registration Form. All veterinarians must conduct themselves during the Championships in compliance with the current FEI Veterinary Regulations and other FEI relevant Rules and Regulations. All Veterinarians requiring stables accreditation must be in possession of an FEI Permitted Treating Veterinarian card. Accreditation for veterinarians will be withdrawn for failure to register in this way.

Veterinarians who are established and lawfully conduct veterinary activities outside Italy may practice in Italy, on the occasion of the FEI Jumping European Championship Milano 2023 only, without being obliged to apply for registration. However, a prior declaration to the regional veterinarian authorities. A form will be sent to NFs by theOC in due course.

Interested parties are required to comply with professional standards applicable in Italy are subject to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the College of Veterinarians.

<u>Permitted Equine therapist have to register themselves with the VC/VD on arrival (Vet Reg.</u> Art. 1125)

13.12 Identification Number (FEI General Regulations Art 114)

Identification numbers for Horses will be distributed upon arrival of the Horses and must be worn at all times, during the Championships at any time the Horse is out of the stables.

13.13 Limb Sensitivity Examination (FEI Veterinary Regulations Art 1048-1053)

All Horses are subject to examination under the protocol for abnormal limb sensitivity throughout the period of an Event. For Jumping that includes, but is not limited to, between rounds and before the Jump Off. Horses may be examined once or on multiple occasions during the Period of an Event.

Horses may be selected for examination under the protocol randomly or they may be targeted. All Horses selected to be tested must submit promptly to the examination or are subject to immediate disqualification. There is no obligation to examine any specific number of Horses at an Event.

13.14 Conditions of Importation

At the time of the first veterinary examination, i.e. upon arrival of the Horses on the venue and before entering the stables, every Athlete is obliged to present a valid FEI passport or an FEI Recognition card cover on an approved passport as well as the health certificates which are required for the transport to the event.

18. CATERING

Chefs d'Equipe, Athletes, Team Vet:

Meals for Chefs d'Equipe, team and individual Athletes, according to the number accommodated at OC cost and team Veterinarians will be provided free of charge catering by the OC from 1 day before Horse inspection to 1 day after the end of the discipline's competition.

Outside these periods <u>and</u> for other Accreditation Holders, catering will be available at NF cost.

The catering service, paid for by the OC, is provided by the lunch of Monday 28th August 2023 to the day after last competition day (breakfast of Monday 4th September 2023).

Chefs d'Equipe, Athletes and Vet Team: Breakfast and dinner will be available at the hotel. Lunch will be available on venue.

Grooms:

The catering service, paid for by the OC, is provided by the lunch of Sunday 27th August 2023 to the day after last competition day (breakfast of Monday 4th September 2023).



All meals for Grooms are guaranteed at the Venue.

19. TRANSPORTATION

19.1 Arrivals and Departures

Official points of arrival in Milan for the NFs:

- Airport: Milano Linate Airport Milano Malpensa Airport and Orio al Serio Airport
- Train station: Milan Central Station

OC will provide, if needed, a shuttle service from these points of arrival to the NFs' hotels or the Venue, for the Accreditation Holders at OC expense: Athletes, Grooms, Chefs d'Equipe, Team Veterinarians. This service will be available at the dates where the OC will pay for the accommodation for the respective Accreditation Holder.

Additional information

Any partners and additional persons who have purchased accreditation, based on the specific rules which we recommend viewing in the 'Transportation' guide, will be entitled to use the shuttles if their badge includes this benefit.

19.2 Transport reimbursement Horses

Transport expenses to be paid by the Athlete or the relevant NFs.

19.3 Transport Operations

Transport service between hotels and the Venue

Accreditation Holders with shuttle paid by OC will have access to a transportation service between hotels and the Venue. Service will start the dates where the OC will pay for the accommodation for the respective Accreditation Holder and end one day after last day of respective competition, and will be adapted to the Stables opening/closing times.

Public transport and taxi to be paid by own expenses

19.4 Parking Passes

Each NF with a team will be provided with 2 parking passes Each NF sending individual athletes will receive 1 parking pass





If the NF would like additional parking passes, the following must be ordered, which will cost an additional 100 €.

19.5 Motorised Vehicles and bicycles on venues

No motorised vehicles (golf cars, motorbikes, etc) other than the OC's own vehicles, except wheelchair accessible vehicles, will be allowed on the venue. Bicycles will be permitted but not allowed in the stable area.

20. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

20.1 Insurances and National Requirements

Equestrian sports involve inherent dangerous risks. To the greatest extent permitted by law, the FEI and the FEI Event Organiser shall NOT be liable for any damages relating to loss of property or injury of any kind to Athletes, Owners, Support Personnel or Horses at or in connection with an FEI Event and the FEI expressly excludes all such liability.

20.1.1 Personal Accident and Health Insurance

It is your responsibility as an Athlete/Owner/ Support Personnel to ensure that you have adequate personal accident insurance in place to cover your participation at FEI Events and in particular to insure against any personal injury or medical expenses arising from an accident, injury or illness which may occur at a FEI Event.

You should check with your National Federation to confirm if your National Federation's insurance policy (if any) covers personal accidents and/or illnesses which may occur when you are attending/participating in FEI Events.

If your National Federation does not have a personal accident/health insurance policy or if the National Federation's insurance policy does not cover personal accident or health claims, then you should obtain your own personal accident and health insurance policy to cover your attendance/participation at FEI Events.

20.1.2 Personal Property Insurance

You should also ensure that you are insured against property loss, theft or damage which may occur at an FEI Event.

Again, the advice is to check with your National Federation to confirm if they have an insurance policy in place which would cover you in case of such property loss, theft or damage. If not, then you should obtain your own personal property insurance to cover such situations.

20.1.3 Press Equipment

Press equipment and other items left in the Press workroom, Press lockers, the Press Tribune or anywhere on the showgrounds are left entirely at the owner's risk. The Organising Committee does not accept any responsibility for any loss or damage to such equipment or items. Members of the Press are advised not to leave any equipment or personal items unattended.

20.2 Athletes and Owners

20.2.1 Third Party Liability Insurance

As an Athlete/Owner you are personally responsible for damages to third parties caused by you, your employees, Support Personnel, your agents or your Horses. You are, therefore, strongly advised to take out third-party liability insurance providing full coverage in relation to FEI Events at home and abroad, and to keep the policy up to date.

The FEI and the Organiser will NOT be responsible for any damage caused to third parties by you, your employees, Support Personnel, your agents or your Horses.

20.2.2 Additional Liability Information

OC does not provide any coverage to eventual damages or any accidents (fire or theft) occured before, during or after the competition. Furthermore horses, athletes and their personal belongings are at their own responsibility during the entire event.

20.2.3 Horse Insurance

As an Owner you should ensure that your Horses are adequately insured against any injuries or illnesses they may sustain while participating at a FEI Event.

20.3 Protests/Appeals

To be valid, all Protests and Appeals must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of CHF 150.- or equivalent, as mentioned in the FEI General Regulations (Art. 161-162) available at the following link:

20.4 Schooling During Competitions

Athletes wishing to school during speed competitions (Table A and Table C) must inform the OC before these competitions begin. These athletes will start first in these competitions.

20.5 Stewarding

 If an athlete is uncertain as to whether the boots they intends to use during an event are allowed, they or their representative should show the boots to the Chief Steward for their opinion before the boots are used in training or in competition.



- In addition, athletes are to be made aware that hind boots must be removed and placed again on the horse's legs in the presence of a Steward while in the warm-up arena prior to entering the competition arena for certain competitions. (If bandages are used in place of boots, athletes are not required to remove the bandages in the warm-up arena.) This procedure is compulsory for competitions for which boot and bandage control is mandatory, that is the Nations Cup, Grand Prix, and the competition with the highest prize money, and is at the discretion of the Chief Steward for other competitions.
- As an alternative to carrying out this procedure at the time designated by the Steward
 an athlete may ask their groom to take the boots to the in-gate and place them on the
 horse's legs in front of the Steward prior to the combination entering the arena.
- The Steward has the authority to intervene if a boot is deemed excessively tight by instructing that the boot be removed and put on again correctly. [Stewards are to note that it is normal for a horse's gait to be somewhat affected immediately after boots have been removed and re-placed.] If an athlete or his/her groom refuses to remove and re-place the boot(s) when instructed to do so by the Steward, a Yellow Warning Card will be issued to the athlete in question.
- If it is deemed impossible or unsafe to remove the hind boots in the warm-up arena
 prior to the combination entering the competition arena, due to an extremely excited
 or nervous horse, the boots of the horse in question are to be removed by the
 athlete/groom following the athlete's round upon leaving the arena and inspected by
 the Steward. This inspection may be carried out during the boot and bandage control
 if the boot and bandage control is carried out for the competition in question.
- This procedure does not replace boot and bandage control after completion of an athlete's round for competitions for which boot and bandage control is mandatory (refer to JRs Art. 244.1).

20.6 Disputes


In the event of any discussion concerning the interpretation of the schedule (in translated languages), the English version will be decisive.

20.7 Modification to Schedule

In exceptional circumstances, together with the approval of Chefs d'Equipe, host NF delegate, if any, and the Ground Jury, the Organiser may change the schedule in order to clarify any matter arising from an omission or due to unforeseen circumstances. Any such changes must be notified to all athletes and officials as soon as possible and they must be reported to the FEI Secretary General by the Technical Delegate, the President of the Ground Jury or the Foreign Judge, as applicable.

In case of a tie for the 12th place in a competition with 12 to 48 starters, the prize money foreseen for the 12th place will be divided equally among the athletes concerned.

For Competitions run in two rounds with more than 12 starters in 2nd round:





OCs that indicate in the schedule that a specific number (that is more than 12) of athletes will return for the second round will be permitted to distribute the prize money for that competition among all the athletes taking part in the second round, even if the second round is followed by a jump-off in case of a tie on penalties for first place after the second round.

DEDUCTIONS FROM PRIZE MONEY AT COMPETITIONS:

Full details of any deductions from prize money must be outlined in the schedule. This includes government taxes. If it is necessary for Organisers to deduct such taxes, they must provide participants with an official form indicating the amount of tax deducted.

The tax form must be provided to the athletes upon arrival and returned to the Organiser prior to departing.

IMPORTANT

The total amount of prize money shown for each Competition in the schedule must be distributed. (FEI General Regulations articles 127 and 128)

For details of the prize money breakdown for each competition please refer to the tables at the end of this document; the Organiser must specify which of the two (2) tables will be used. The total prize money for the Competition must be distributed among the first twelve (12) placed athletes.

The Organiser must provide additional created prizes for athletes placed beyond twelfth (12th) place. The minimum amount for each of these additional prizes, for athletes placed from thirteenth (13th) to last place, must be clearly specified in the approved schedule and not exceed the prize money of the athlete placed twelfth (12th)

20.10 Maximum number of starters per competition

*Annex VI FEI Jumping Rules:

Maximum 100 starters per Competition other than the GP. If more than 100 starters are declared, the OC must split the Competition into the number of groups required to ensure that there are no more than 100 starters in any group, and provide the same amount of prize money as indicated for the original Competition for each group. The additional prize money provided by the OC is not taken into consideration with regard to the overall prize money that determines the star level of the Event or the Longines Ranking point group of the Competition, if applicable.

OCs may apply either of the following methods for splitting the Competition:

The competition is split into the number of groups required before it starts. There may be athletes with multiple horses in each group but all horses of any one athlete must be in the same group. If it is not possible to have groups of equal size there may be a different number of starters in each group;



OR

The competition is run as one single competition and split afterward into the number of groups required to ensure that there are no more than 100 starters in any group, and the classification established as follows: the athlete with the best score is the winner of the first group, the athlete with the second best score is the winner of the second group and so on until prizes have been allocated to 25% of the total number of starters. NB: In this case separate results must be sent to the FEI for each of the groups, e.g. results for Competition 1a and for Competition 1b (and for Competition 1c if the original Competition was split into three groups, etc).

In both cases above each group must offer the same amount of prize money as indicated for the original Competition. For the avoidance of doubt, it is the number of declared starters in the Competition, not the final number of starters that determines whether the Competition must be split.

As all FEI World Cup™ Competitions have the status of a Grand Prix, the minimum prize money requirements for the Grand Prix are applicable to the FEI World Cup™ Competition. For CSI-W Events with a Grand Prix Competition in addition to the FEI World Cup™ Competition, the minimum prize money requirements for the Grand Prix apply only to the FEI World Cup™ Competition; the Grand Prix Competition at such Events cannot offer more prize money than the prize money offered for the FEI World Cup™ Competition.

20.11 Glossary FEI Jumping Rules:

Fees:

- Compulsory Fee: Compulsory Fees are fees that may be charged by the OC for costs/services not included in the Entry Fee. Compulsory Fees, if charged, must be paid by the Athletes concerned as outlined below. Only the following Compulsory Fees may be charged by the OC, providing full details of the amount to be charged is included in the Schedule and approved by the FEI:
 - NF fee if applicable
 - NF medication control programme fee if applicable
 - FEI EADCMR fee if applicable (OC to indicate in the Schedule if the EADCMR fee is included in the Entry Fee or not)
 - Fee for health/customs-related documents for Horses if these have been requested by the Athlete.
 - Fee for manure disposal (maximum € 40 per horse per Event)
 - Fee for lorry parking if applicable (The fee indicated in the Schedule may only be charged per lorry not per Athlete.)
 - Fee for electric hook-up for lorry (The fee indicated in the Schedule may only be charged per lorry, not per Athlete.)
- Discretionary Fee: Discretionary Fees are fees that may be charged for optional commodities/services that may be purchased by an Athlete if they so choose and that do not affect the equity of the Athlete's right to compete at the Event or the well-being of the Horse, such as:
 - VIP or premium parking
 - VIP table
 - Extra box for tack or for non-competing Horse
 - Extra bedding and/or fodder (details to be included e.g. shavings, straw, hay)

- Premium stabling (all stabling at the Event must meet minimum FEI requirements)
- Entry Fee: The Entry Fee is the fee charged to participate in an Event with one Horse and covers the following:
 - Stabling of one Horse for the duration of the Event (includes cleaning and disinfecting stables before the event, including between Events that are part of Tours, water and electricity in the stables, first bedding or a fixed amount of bedding depending on the type of event and 24 hour security services for the stables)
 - Use of all facilities at the Event (no infrastructure fees may be charged)
 - Right to participate in all Competitions in accordance with the conditions in the Schedule (no nomination fees or start fees may be charged)
 - Administrative/Office fees (includes all services relating to administration of the Event and running of the Competitions: data/results/timing services, bookkeeping and accreditation services).

Failure from OCs of International Events to provide the FEI with the appropriate result(s) and/or prize money information by the aforesaid deadline and/or in the aforesaid format shall entail a warning for the first violation and thereafter a fine of CHF 1'000.- per violation.

The FEI may request a copy of the official PDF result signed by the relevant Officials at the Event.
